Sunday greeted us with far finer weather and a Caseg cooked breakfast. We headed out to Ogwen to climb some slabby multipitches, but on arrival it appeared that half of Wales had also headed to Ogwen. It was decided, therefore, that we would split. Mark, Sam and Rob climbed a multipitch, in boots, taking them about 3 hours. Matt and I headed around the lakes to take in the scenery and greet various dogs that happened to be frequenting the area before heading back to leafy but rockless Surrey.

A marvellous time was had by all on the Wales meet, we ate well, we drank well, we climbed well. Generally we were stunned, as usual, by the beauty that is North Wales and I very much enjoyed my first trip as a ULGMC member.

Any other business: The ULMC want to celebrate their 60th anniversary, which takes place in the 2008/2009 academic year and have invited us to contribute. They will let us know once they have more details and the President is keeping in touch with Linda, the ULMC president.

The next committee meeting is set for 28 October 2008, which will enable us to take in all the suggestions and ideas from the AGM.

## Minutes of the 58th Annual General Meeting of ULGMC

### Held at the Millstone, Hathersage on Saturday 20 October 2008

The meeting convened at 6 pm with the President, Tim Marshall, in the chair.

#### 1. Apologies for absence

#### 2. Minutes of the 2007 AGM

The minutes were unanimously accepted as a true record.

#### 3. Matters arising

There were no matters arising.

#### 4. Committee reports

#### <u>President</u>

The President's written report 2007-8 was handed to all present and will be printed in the newsletter.

Tim announced his retirement as president and thanked the past and present committee members. He wished John and Laura Hampton best wishes on their new life in Australia.

The issue of an ageing club is slowly being addressed with Stuart Elliott writing to the ULMC as a first step, the committee putting together new information and leaflets for recent graduates and an introductory membership fee for recent graduates.

Tim also mentioned that the ULMC were planning a 60th anniversary event for the 2008/2009 academic year and had invited us to an as yet unspecified event in London.

On the subject of the huts Tim noted that the Caseg refurbishment was nearly complete and we could now look towards the essential fire safety work required for Fallcliffe.

Tim also noted that changes in legislation meant that we now required a responsible named person for each hut, which made the safety work even more important. There was no difference in the safety and related requirements whether the huts were members only or open to non-members to book. Tim is going to write up a report on the BMC hut seminar he recently attended for the newsletter.

He also reiterated that the BMC affiliation not only gives us liability insurance but also pays for the legal advice, the representation of our interests towards the government and other bodies, as well as access to the hut insurance and the travel insurance schemes.

#### <u>Secretary</u>

The secretary reported that most newsletter were now sent per e-mail, which meant a lot less work in printing and posting newsletters and asked anyone not receiving their newsletter to contact him directly.

#### Treasurer/membership Secretary

The Treasurer/Membership Secretary presented the latest membership figures of 40 single members and 130 family members. The club currently has assets of £6413.60 in the bank. Keith had not been able to produce full club accounts yet (independent of the hut accounts), but hoped to have these ready for the next newsletter. Keith proposed the new membership fees to be increased in line with the BMC affiliation fee increase and the new fees of £20 for single members, £30 for family membership and, for their first year only, £12 for new graduates and children reaching the age of 18 were approved by the meeting. Keith also noted that we had not made our usual donations and it was suggested to make these to the Friends of Snowdonia, the Friends of the Lake District and the Mountain Rescue Committees of England, Scotland and Wales; the exact donations were to be left

to the committee. Keith was also asked to split out the costs of membership so members knew what the membership went to in detail. It was also requested that we clarify the status of children with regard to their membership status within the club.

Keith also expressed his thanks to Shaun West for the newsletter and web site; Dave Morley for looking after Fallcliffe; and Stuart Elliott for liaising with the ULMC.

#### Meets Secretary

Sue Darling reported that the meets had generally gone well last year and next years meets list was being finalised and a draft was handed to all at the meeting. Sue thanked everyone who had replied to the questionnaire and thanked the meet leaders.

#### <u>Huts</u>

In the absence of the hut wardens Tim reported that the Caseg account would be in the next newsletter and the Fallcliffe accounts would be available soon. Tim also reported that the hut trustees had decided to increase the hut fees and the new fees would be £5 for members of the club and students of the University of London and Imperial College, £6 for other students and £8 for others. Under-fives would be free. Further, Tim had attended the BMC Hut Seminar which summed up the current state of legislation and gave much needed advice on new requirements.

<u>BMC Committee for Wales – report</u> from Trefor Owen.

There were parking issues near Cloggy; the national park had been asked to post warning signs about the danger of the great outdoors; the Nant Peris to Pen-ypass footpath was now complete, but not in a perfect state; the round Snowdon trek was now complete and postcard sized map card were available and very good indeed; there were still access problems at Langollen; Osprey had nested successfully; the Welsh Highland railway was nearly complete, about 30 feet were still missing.

The meets programme for next year was ready and Sue and Keith would help ease Heather into her new position.

Tim suggested having a spring meet in mid-Wales.

#### **10 Any Other Business**

Members were invited to think of ideas for the upcoming 60th anniversary of the club.

Elements of the club archive were being passed from Sue Esten to Jill Bennett.

### Committee meeting 28 October 2008

Present: KM, SD, HR, MS

Apologies: NB, SW, TM

Sue Darling opened the meeting as the new president and proposed the meeting follow up on the issues raised at the AGM.

#### Finance

In the area of finance our aim was to stay solvent and maintain a working reserve. The club was currently in a healthy state and in control of its spending. KM was maintaining an ordered bookkeeping system and this would enable the treasurer to produce ordered accounts in the future which can be audited. Our expenditure was currently estimated to be within our income and we established that we would be happy with a reserve that equated to roughly two years expenditure.

#### Membership

In an effort to expand our membership, MS had gathered all the information we needed to start on a membership campaign with current students of the University and existing Alumni. We needed informational material aimed at older alumni as well as material aimed at existing students. It was also noted that the ULMC is not THE climbing club of the University anymore. All larger colleges have their own clubs and as such the ULMC membership only represents a small minority of climbers within the University. There are no formal links between the college clubs and the ULMC. This means any membership campaign needs to be broader. HR volunteered to produce some student friendly material. MS volunteered to implement a paperless application system, which meant that application and payments could happen without paper. The committee also noted that the website needed much new material, including all forms in a accessible way. We will also design an insert for the hut booking form, so students become aware of the club at an early stage. We needed to find out bed nights of the university clubs. HR suggested having a new members meet as an evening event at a central London climbing wall with a sociable pub event thereafter. MS was going to lead the March Fallcliffe meet as a new and prospective member meet.

#### Meets

The committee decided to produce guidance notes for meet leaders, so that new meet leaders knew what to do and we could get newer members involved in leading meets.

SD handed over organisation of the next AGM and dinner to HR. The 2009 AGM will take place in North Wales, the 2010 AGM will take place in the Lakes.

#### Newsletter

We decided to create a more enticing whole committee report, rather than the lengthy current reports. As we get asked the same questions regularly we thought of producing a useful resources section in each newsletter. HR will chase up meets reports and has started writing those which she attended herself.

#### Huts

It was decided to suggest donating some of our funds to the improvement of Fallcliffe once the basic work was done. Any suggestions from the membership would be welcome.

## President's corner

## Tim Marshall President's report 2007-8

This my last report in this role, and I would like to start by thanking all the other post-holders who in their various ways have helped to keep the club together over the last 6 years. They have done the work, not me.

Next, I want to make a special mention of John and Laura Hampton, who are unable to be here this year, and who may not be at an AGM ever again. Laura one of the founder members, a former Caseg hut warden, and a former president - and John are moving to Australia in a month's time. Their change of address will be in the N/L, but I would like here to acknowledge the immense debt we owe them both, not least for our very existence. I think the club should send them a formal letter of thanks, and I hope you agree.

The main content of the report is about the three themes that have been of recurring interest - to me, if not to you! over the last six years: The club; the huts, and the BMC. I'll take them in that order.

#### The dub.

Like lots of other clubs, ULGMC is aging; but it doesn't have to be like that, and indeed it shouldn't be. Many of you will have seen the e-mail from the ULMC president which I sent round; the task is to persuade the new graduates to join us and, sooner rather than later, take over the running of the club. We are trying three approaches to canvassing new members.

Firstly, Stuart Elliott has been in touch with ULMC promoting the benefits of joining us, and I have followed this up in reply to the e-mail sent by their president.

Secondly, we shall repeat the exercise Sue Esten undertook a few years ago, by contacting the alumni associations of the London colleges, asking them to circulate information about the club to their members.

(For both of the above, we hope soon to have an on-line application form which can be sent electronically to the Membership Secretary). Thirdly, we are developing a blurb about the club, and this, together with an application form (and the agreement of the hut wardens), will be sent out to all student aroups booking the hut in future.

#### The huts.

We have spent a large amount of money upgrading Caseg. It's not quite completely finished, but will be (I hope) by Christmas. The reserves are reduced accordingly, though there is still a 5-figure sum available immediately to attend to the most pressing problem at Fallcliffe, fire safety. This latter was the main subject of the recent BMC huts seminar, which I'll write a report about for the N/L after this one.

One of the consequences of this work is that hut fees will have to go up. The Trustees agreed the following rates, applicable to any bookings made after October 15th (i.e. any existing bookings, no matter when for, get the old rates).

Members, their children, and U of L students: £5 pppn

Other students: £6 pppn

Others: £8 pppn

Children under 5: free.

#### The BMC

I'm aware that there is some scepticism about the BMC and the value the club gets from its affiliation. Elsewhere in this N/L there is a report from the BMC AGM in April, which some might find enlightening.

There are, as far as I can tell, two main "benefit streams".

Firstly (and I've written about this before), insurance on the huts and their contents. This is done through a BMC package, with underwriters who are clued up to what climbing huts are like, and about. (This is more important than you might think: a few years ago, Glan Dena, at the head of Llyn Ogwen, was assessed for rates as though it was a Youth Hostel, and Helyg was rated as a community home!). The importance of having underwriters or rating valuation officers who understand nature of the premises is obvious, and I doubt we could do anything like as well if we went independently to the insurance market.

Secondly, I was surprised to learn that the "affiliation fee" - £11.75 next year - isn't all to do with 3rd party insurance. Full details are in the report of the BMC AGM, but for me the most important element is that of insurance for officers, meet leaders, hut wardens and trustees. At £3.13 per person, we have insurance up to £10M for any one incident. If I tell you that the underwriters are currently facing a claim of several million pounds for a single incident (not climbing - someone wandered away from a bona fide sports event organised by a club, fell into a river and broke their neck) you can see how critical it is that we have decent insurance. Again, I can't imagine that it would be possible to obtain such a deal covering 15 - 20 people in the various categories described above.

That's all. Thank you for electing me president; I hope you don't feel your trust was misplaced. And (too late for those not at the dinner) enjoy the meal.


Tim is a hard act to follow as President but I'll do my best, and am always open to your thoughts and ideas.

## **BMC** news

## **BMC April meeting**

The BMC AGM was held in Northumberland in April, hosted by the Northumberland Mountaineering Club. A bitter east wind on the Saturday saw the westward-facing Bowden Doors and Ravens crags plastered with BMC members, basking in the blazing sunshine and very well sheltered by the crags themselves.

The AGM itself was rather less fractious than some I've been to: many of "the usual suspects" were absent, which made for fairly level-headed discussion. The main proposal affecting us, mentioned in the last N/L, was the proposal to raise the (adult) capitation fee to £11.75. For the first time we had a breakdown of how this was made up: Administration of club membership: £3.03; 1 copy of Summit: 0.76p; Civil liability insurance: £3.13; Access and conservation: £2.01; National and international representation: £1.42; all else (volunteer development, hut coordination committee, technical committee and some odds and sods: £1.40).

Set out like that, it doesn't seem quite so unreasonable to me. They re-iterated the long-term goal of setting the capitation fee at 50% of the individual membership fee (to be £29.95 in 2009). It was confirmed that hut insurance - buildings and contents - is done separately, but the civil liability element does cover liability to other persons in the huts (e.g in the event that there is a fire in a hut and someone is injured).

I raised the matter of insurance for kids: there will be a capitation fee of £7.00, which doesn't sound too bad unless you're in a club like ours which doesn't charge separately for child members; and we can't afford to subsidise that directly from club funds. There was some sympathy with the position we find ourselves in - I don't think we're the only club that has children coming along, but not as full members in their own right - and a sort of "well, if you don't tell us they're a member, we won't know, and won't charge" (that's a very unofficial version of what was said!). But if you want your child to have the civil liability protection, you can pay the BMC £7.00 directly.
