#### **Annual Scottish meet**

# John Coote and Trevor Hellen reports:

Each year in early May an extraordinary event occurs in the Scottish Highlands. A group of veteran mountaineers with a record of ascents of routes on major peaks in all areas of the world, and all members of ULGMC, meet for a week at some exotic venue in these Mountains with eyes set on climbing as many Munros or Corbetts as the weather and spirit enables.

The extraordinary is justified by the notable age range of the group, 65-82yrs at the present time. It might also be considered extraordinary by the perseverance that some like Willy Butler, Dave and Liz Lindsey, Tony Gilby, Trefor Owen, Trevor Hellen, Jerry Wright and Dave Smith, have displayed to reach the target of having climbed all of the 284 Munro summits (>3000ft) despite advancing age and deterioration of body systems. Of course, when all the Munros have been climbed, even though you are over 70 (like Jerry), the ascent of all the 221 Corbetts (2500-3000ft) becomes the next keen ambition, even though not always openly admitted

The meet is the brain child of Willy Butler, whose strong Scottish roots force him to go back each year to show off to the Sassenachs amongst us his knowledge of his native mountains and his ability to pronounce their Gaelic names, only dwarfed by his displaying his tastes for the local

whisky. Despite the strong desire to ascend everything that looks like a hill, the group is not above spending time walking the glens and visiting sites of historical interest.

This year some 22 of us found our way by car or train to Poolewe in the Torridon area of the NW Highlands. Poolewe is an excellent centre with great mountain views but also lots of interesting coastline and low level walks in the mountains for had weather. Also lots of WW2 naval history on Loch Ewe's shores and beaches. A few intrepid members tried beach sunbathing during brief breaks in the threatening clouds. This proved challenging as, between the violent gusts of wind blown cold rain that seemed to pierce the skin, the midges attacked mercilessly. Fortunately, the weather was so stormy that not much opportunity was afforded for midges to feed off ULGMC blood. Perhaps the best aspect of this coastal area is the Inverewe Gardens, looked after by the Scottish National Trust. The warm climate accompanying the Gulf Stream has enabled vast varieties of plants of temperate and mediterranean origin to flourish. The gardens are set in hilly slopes that were close to our accommodation and provided an excellent relaxation to visit on a rest day. Visits were made there by many of us, partly to see the lush and colourful shrubs and partly to walk up and down the sloping paths for some sneaky mountain training.

The weather was stormy and turbulent with bursts of heavy rain and high winds and even snow down to 800m. Despite this, for most of the group 5 days were spent on lung bursting ascents with knees and thighs screaming or on long trails through the hills of Torridon, and even occasionally like Dave and Liz Lindsey mountain biking along the coastal area. Notable ascents were made of one Munro, Ben Eighe, by Tony, Michael and John and five Corbetts including Sail Mhor, Baosbheinn, Beinn an Eoin, Beinn Airigh Charr and Meall a'Ghuibhais by groups including Jerry, Dave Smith, John Coote, Trevor, John Parsons, Joy, Trefor, Patsy, Mike and Sue Esten, and John Burrows. Jerry had targeted a number of Corbetts. Along with Dave Smith (a welcome guest at the meet who had himself just a handful of Corbetts to complete), he succeeded on three but was turned back on others, being unable to get across swollen rivers, as also happened to others in the group on other ascents. Of note on the one day of decent weather was the ascent of Meall a'Ghuibhais, almost a Munro, protected by a final steep 400m headwall. This provided a stern test of heart, lungs and knees that was ascended in under the guidebook time by a group of nine of us geriatrics, whose ages ranged from 68 to 82 vrs.

Even low level routes became challenging because of the high winds and rain. Bill (Towlson) and Les (Bailey), Geoff and Margaret (Batten) and John Coote planned, despite the rather threatening weather, to take a boat across Loch Maree from the Hotel of that name but were dissuaded by four foot high waves that meant they would have been wet through before landing on the other side and then would have had to endure a long (14km) and serious trek through the pass east of Beinn Airigh Charr back to Poolewe. Instead, the scenic Slatterdale trail (8km) along the NW side of Loch Maree back to Poolewe was taken and is to be recommended.

The second was the group dinner in the Gairloch Hotel on the final night organized by Janet Hellen. Overall this was a very successful meet and many thanks go to Willy for arranging it. The accommodation in the bungalows was great with lots of ensuite facilities and good kitchen and sitting room, a far cry from the old bothy days where we were continuously cold and wet. So we oldies can still climb a bit but we do like some comfort these days!.

# Welsh Coastal Meet 4th – 8th July 2011

An excellent meet – only got soaked once! 12 participants in total, though not all necessarily there at the same time. Aberaeron, the little town just outside which we camped, is extremely pretty – its Georgian houses are painted in varying,

sometimes startling, colours. The camp site was a bit basic -geared towards caravaners, but such facilities as existed were impeccably kept. It was good also to have made the meet run Monday thru Friday – it made arrangements more flexible for folks. What did we do? Sue, the book, (a Pathfinder guide to Ceredigion - now pronounce that!) had chosen various circular walks from the book - which were more or less followed. Bill exhibited his usual penchant for turning perambulations into 'Bill specials' - but to be fair to him, the OS maps seemed to indicate paths which were - shall we say - a little difficult to find on the ground! Yes, it was them not us!

On Monday two of the more energetic walked a round from Aberaeron to Aberarth and back along the coastal path via the church and churchyard on the hill whose tombstones punctuate the skyline like so many broken teeth. Tuesday's walk was based on Newquay, from where we walked southwestwards along the coastal path before heading inland - deviating from the script (book) and navigating back to Newquay closer to the coast than originally foreseen (and thereby missing a pub!!!). Wednesday saw us parking on the outskirts of Llangrannog and walking to the coast via the Urdd Youth centre - and its ski slope. We soon descended from the cliff path to the headland at Ynys-Lochtyn, an absolutely beautiful spot. ### Joss Naylor Challenge – Completed 3 July 2011

The Joss Naylor Challenge covers 48 miles across 30 peaks of the Lake District from Pooley Bridge at the mouth of Ullswater to Greendale in Wasdale. It has 16000 feet of ascent. The challenge at my age is to finish inside 24 hours.

Towards the end of June my friend Michael Hetherton phoned about doing the Joss Naylor Challenge at the beginning of July only two weeks away. I thought it would take me about 21 hours and made a schedule based on my state of fitness and valuable information from Monica Shone.

Mike reckoned it was 14 years since we completed the Bob Graham round together. Mike is just a youngster. He only had 18 hours since he was 2 weeks off 65. There's always next year.

Nearly all of our various running friends were of course running or otherwise busy at such short notice. Just one, Julian Spencer from Spectrum Striders (my club), said he would run the first leg some of which would be in the night. The Monday before I trotted the first leg to remind myself of the details for the dark time with Mike Bate helping with the section to Loadpot Hill and transport.

For the attempt Don Low agreed to take us (Colin Grime, Mike Hetherton and Julian Spencer) to Pooley Bridge, meet Mike and me at Kirkstone Pass, Dunmail Raise and at the end at Greendale Bridge. John Pearson, an old friend from school days, arranged to go to Styhead Pass with important supplies.

The small team assembled at Beetham Cottage (Fell & Rock Climbing Club) near Brothers Water on Saturday afternoon for eating and getting ready. After a little rest we got up at midnight.

The night was perfect cool (5 centigrade) with no wind for the start from Pooley Bridge at 1.00 am.

The north eastern sky was marbled grey and amazing like a Turner painting.

The night was otherwise dark with no moon. The valleys filled with mist that rose to cover our way but only for a few minutes. Larks were singing at 3 o'clock and we could switch off our torches. Running down High Street we surprised many red deer and with Julian carrying the rucksack we made good time all the way to Kirkstone Pass.

After breakfast and a welcome cup of tea Mike and I shouldered our rucksacks and set off up Red Screes warmed by the rising sun. A ring ouzel flew past at the top and Great Gable seemed a world away. We trotted along to Fairfield and down over Seat Sandal to Dunmail Raise where Don had made more tea. Monica Shone was there to greet us having just driven from Anglesey.

We were a few minutes behind schedule and had a good rest. After the steep climb up Steel Fell the route is less dramatic over High Raise and Rossett Pike until the splendid way up Bowfell from the top of Rossett Gill. There was a little pressure on time since the idea was to descend Middle Fell near the end in the daylight. There was some breeze at times and the temperature was perfect. The way off Great End is worth knowing down the steep ground of the Band. My phone rang with a message from John at Styhead. It was good to know he was there.



After a long rest we loaded up drinks and tackled the long climb up Gable on perhaps the best leg of the route. At the top we had a look at the War Memorial to some great climbers and brave men. The grassy run off Kirk Fell is a good way down to Black Sail before the long haul up the broad ridge of Pillar. On the descent Black Crag, Scoat Fell and Steeple were impressive against the light. Trotting down the grass towards Haycock was pleasant. Mike carried my bag up Haycock. The way to Seatallan looked short but seemed to get longer and higher as we descended. From the top, steep grass took us towards Middle Fell and the

final gentle descent to Greendale Bridge. We switched on our torches for Don to see but it turned out he was having a beer with Joss. We arrived at ten forty just as darkness took over. The route is brilliant and the cup of tea in Joss's house was special.



The TMB over a long weekend

#### Shaun West writes:

The aim was to walk the wrong way around the TMB, starting at la Mont Roc and ending either in les Houches or les Contamines. I only had four days... Friday, after lunch, I took the train to Chamonix and stay at the hotel close to the station.

Day 1: The aim is to walk from Mont Roc - la Planet and a monster walk to Champex. Ought to take two days but one should be enough! Just... The walk up above La Tour on the ridge was great, nice way to start and get some air before the rain at la Balm. The rain came and went all day from that point onwards. The glacier recession of the la Trient glacier was amazing - I cannot believe that back in 93 I was walking on a flat section that is now part of the river. I took the high route over the Fenetre d'Arpette, I got to the top at 1800 and then down to the hotel at 2030, 11 hours after setting out.



Day 2: Bus to La Fouly, saved a walk along/by the road so worth the 5CHF (some things are cheap in Switzerland! At La Fouly it was still raining, so lunch and then off up the hill for another big day - the objective being Courmayeur via Petite Col Ferret. So by the time I got up to 2000m the rain turned to snow. At the col the clouds broke and gave some great views of the hills and the valley down to Courmayeur. I would have gone via Bonatti but I had not started until 1300 so no time. The decent was very steep on slippy mud. The late summer views of the valley made the effort all worth while and the hitch half way down the valley meant I got to the hotel before 2200 - very odd chatting to an Italian both speaking French.

Day 3: Taxi to the end of the road up to Elisabetta, the objective to try to get up to the Col de la Croix du Bonhomme. But the weather was bad... snowing at 1700m and windy. The walk to Elisabetta is up a long road, snow is better than rain as it stays on the outside of the jacket! The wind was tough and the plateau was snowy and even windier. The final accent on the Col de la Seigne meant wading in 30cm deep snow fine but without any tracks and in foggy conditions. Still got there in the end and the clouds broke creating some fantastic views. It did not last and on the decent to Chapieux the rain and wind got stronger and colder. The last 5km or so on the road were the worst of the whole trip. So pleased to enter the hotel. Ended up speaking Italian to an Italian sitting opposite me (he did not speak much English) sandwiched between two groups of Americans.



Day 4: Objective was to get home, I cut the day short by only walking over to Les Contamines, then hitching, getting a bus and train to get home. The walk up to the Col de la Croix du Bonhomme was just under the sign post times but then there was 30cm of snow from half way up. The traverse to la Col du Bonhomme was tough as there were no foot prints and I had to break trail the whole way. From the col down to the valley was much easier, prints to follow and enjoy the clear blue sky. The connections I managed in the valley meant that I was home by 2000!

# Membership Sec / Treasurer's Report

A few years ago the number of graduates in undergraduate clubs was increasing beyond what was considered, by some, to be healthy. The then president of ULMC put a proposal to ULU limiting the proportion to 30%.

The direct result of this change was an influx of ex ULMC and college club members. We also have a few ULMC and club members who are also ULGMC members. Some of these members are intending to attend the AGM. Last year we took a look at the past 60 years. It is often more interesting to look into a crystal ball!

This year's membership is, I am afraid to report, below that for 2010. Failed again. Many of those who had renewed last year, often after a long break, have thought better of it. I hope more will renew for 2012 if only to attend the champagne breakfast being provided after the dinner!

With regard to the fees for 2012 I would like to recommend, again, that they remain as before, £20 single, £30 joint and £7 for child affiliation. The BMC affiliation remains the same. Overseas members will pay £6.50 and £8.50 respectively.

Thank you for your support in 2011. I feel more confident now that, should the numbers of more active members of the club continue to rise as they have this year, the club has a secure future. Please enjoy the dinner, and the breakfast at 7:30am on Sunday. Sorry, couldn't resist the temptation!

## ULGMC's part in The Festival of Britain

This year marks the 60th anniversary of the Festival of Britain, which opened on London's South Bank in May 1951. A striking symbol of the Festival was the Skylon - the 'Vertical Feature' erected between Westminster Bridge and Hungerford Bridge. The Skylon consisted of a steel latticework frame, pointed at both ends and supported on cables slung between three steel beams. The partially constructed Skylon was rigged vertically, then grew taller in situ. The base was nearly 15 metres (50 feet) from the ground, with the top nearly 90 metres (300 feet) high. It presented an irresistible challenge to five London University students..who planned to climb the Skylon prior to the opening of the Festival by King George VI. Two of the students were members of LGMC: Phil Gurdon (then known in the Club as 'Peegee') who actually made the climb, and John Fowle.

It was planned 3 months earlier: they obtained detailed plans and maps from the Festival authorities, designed and made special climbing equipment including 'hook irons' to get a hold on the metal frame. They also used to two nylon ropes, one 120ft long and the other 220ft long with a special climbing release hook for the climbers' safety. At about 11.15 they managed to enter the South Bank site, then two of them made the climb after midnight, when the floodlights were switched off. They had intended to leave a small bottle of whisky on top for whoever was sent to get the ropes down, but towards the top the going was difficult and the ropes kept snarling on the reflector lights. They left a 'flag', a University of London Air Squadron scarf.

On 'Festival Day', Thurs.3rd May 1951, the (London) Evening Standard headline reported "Students hang flag on Skylon after 250ft climb". No damage was done, and they afterwards apologized. (A workman was sent to climb the steps inside the Skylon to bring down the flag at

8.30am). The Festival authorities said: "It is a prank. We shall not prosecute."

Stella Berkeley told me part of this story in a letter (in 1999) and sent presscuttings. She wrote: "Phil always struck me as being a bit of a buccaneer but a very likeable one. He subsequently qualified as a commercial pilot, and the last I heard of him he was working in the middle east, though not, I think, flying passenger planes. Sometime in the late 50's or early 60's I heard that the plane he was flying had disappeared (presumably over the sea) and was never found."

She would have been amazed to hear the end of this story - which sprang into life in January 2011 when I happened to hear an item on BBC Radio 4's *PM* programme: There were suggestions to re-create part of the Festival of Britain, including the Skylon, and **Philip Gurdon** was interviewed about his part in this escapade - sadly, he didn't mention the Club!. So he didn't disappear with his plane after all - I'm sure Stella would have enjoyed hearing this.

## 50th Anniversary of Caseg Fraith

[cont. from last Newsletter]

## Jill Bennet (Club Archivist) writes:

The Feb.1961 Newsletter reported:
"The Hut is usable as it stands but is pretty bleak inside. It seems that ULMC were promised gifts of furnishings which have not materialized. Work will still have to be done on the basic furnishings after the builders official hand over. Such fixed items as cupboards, shelves etc will have to be made, probably on the spot, and to get such jobs done the Hut Committee will be asking for working parties. Will anyone who can do this sort of work please get in touch with the Hon. Secs.[Laura & John Hampton] indicating at what times they might be able to go to North Wales for this purpose.

At the moment, 3 or 4 heavy old-fashioned tables with chairs and benches will be needed, together with quantities of cutlery, strong china and cooking utensils. Items such as tables might be a problem to transport, though it is sometimes possible to take them to pieces and re-erect on site. Alternatively it might be possible to find someone who would move them on the roof of a car or van going to North Wales."

By May '61, the newsletter announced: "The official opening of the hut has tentatively been fixed for the weekend 27th29th October, 1961. A coach (or coaches) will run from London and it is planned to hold a dinner on the Saturday evening. No doubt many members will wish to attend and more details will be given later. As regards the name of the hut, many possibilities have been canvassed and the choice seems to rest with "Caseg Fraith" which is the name of a Llyn about a mile away.

The work of equipping the hut seems to progress very slowly. Though various fittings such as the stove are ready, they have not yet been installed by the builders. These matters will be raised with the architect. Various items such as "Elsan" have been presented. A snag has appeared about electricity as it seems the local board were raising difficulty over the supply. It is hoped that the problem will be solved by negotiations. In view of the incomplete state of the hut the present charge is 1/6 per night instead of 2/6 as originally fixed."

Before the grand opening, a working party weekend was organised by **Willie Butler** on 14/15th Oct. for shelves and other interior fittings to be made. 50 tons of rubble had been ordered for the car park and road, which had to be laid

The opening: **Prof. G I Finch** (a former President of ULMC) formally opened Caseg Fraith at 3pm on Sat. 28th October 1961. A dinner was held afterwards at the Dolbadarn Arms hotel in Llanberis to mark the occasion. The Nov. 1961 Newsletter reported:

"The Hon. Secretaries [ie the Hamptons] and a number of other members attended. Between 60 and 70 members of ULMC slept on the floor at the hut for the weekend, but as far as we know it was not burned down.

The hut is very bare at the moment. There are mattresses but no blankets or bunks, concrete floor, no curtains, partitions or mats. The stove works and the water supply. Some shelving was put up on the last working weekend but more is needed. Elsans are there. The road has been begun but more slate will be needed. There is no lighting but mains electricity may not be installed for at least five years according to the electricity authority. As an alternative we may have to generate our own. Does anyone know where a secondhand generator could be obtained cheaply?

To make a start with the equipment, could each member of the LGMC. please give one knife, fork and spoon? If each member does this then the cutlery problem is solved as this Club now has about 50 members. Please either bring these to the AGM dinner or send them to the Hon. Secs. if you cannot come to the Dinner. Also much-needed crockery, large teapots or urn, washingup bowls, buckets, saucepans, kettle, Tilley or oil lamps, blankets, more

mattresses, bunks, wooden boxes for use as food boxes, spades, chairs (preferably kitchen type but more comfortable ones also useful), one large and one small table, floor coverings, curtains. If you can offer any of these, please inform Dr.W.H. Butler.

It is hoped that members who come to the AGM Dinner will be able to spend some time working on the hut. Even an hour or two would be useful. If you can bring woodworking tools including brace and bits, and masonry drills, and spades, please do so. Willie Butler will be staying at the hut that weekend and will tell people, what needs doing."

The AGM & dinner was held at the Pen y Gwryd Hotel on 2<sup>nd</sup> Dec. 1961 attended by 28 members and guests. After dinner the Club adjourned to the billiard room where members produced slides to show that they had not been completely inactive during the year. About 10 members stayed at the Hut. On Sunday a working party was formed under the direction of Willie Butler, and John Hampton produced a magnificent chest of woodworking tools - with them a broom cupboard, set of reinforced shelves and a continental style bunk materialized.

The Feb. 1961 newsletter said: "The Hut Warden [Willie Butler] reports that the hut is now heavily booked almost every weekend. The work of equipping the hut is proceeding slowly, the bunks are up and many minor improvements have been affected. A bid was made for a generator, but not accepted, and a higher offer has now been made. The wiring of the hut will be carried out shortly."

In 1962, an arrangement was made with farmer Williams to share the costs of a generator and the hut was wired for electric light - memorably inscribed as a new climbing route in the hut log book on 27th May 1962 as "Butler's Eliminate". By special request, this will be included in the next Newsletter...
