hours were very windy and wet, but also very snowy (knee deep) which made the climb more than worth it.



#### Scotland meet

Several unpremeditated events marked this year's Scottish meet. These ranged from a car's suspension failure caused by the state of the road near Kingshouse in Glencoe (beware!), to breakfast with the laird of the Attadale estate. But incidents aside, the best 'event' was the daily appearance of the sun, with wall to wall sunshine being our luck on many days. Nineteen of us attended for most of the time; however not all were participating fully on the hill - Mike Esten was just 5 weeks post bi-lateral total knee replacements and Willie Butler was/is struggling with a faulty hip replacement that needs re-doing.



4 comfortable cottages belonging to the estate provided our accommodation: these were about 10 minutes walk away from the Attadale Gardens, beautifully cared for and maintained gardens surrounding the laird's manor which are open to the public. As cottage tenants we enjoyed free access at any time to these gardens – a fully appreciated benefit.

So what did we do in the way of hill activities? Note, I am not describing our 'achievements' as mountaineering, although navigational skills on our first day's outing were called into question! First day - and a modest target was deemed appropriate, so 15 of us set off up the glen to make a round trip which would eventually bring us back to the main road near the entrance to the estate. All went well until we left the forest track to strike across to the footpath which would permit the descent to the loch (Carron) side. We ploughed across heather and tussocky grass, at last finding a path that seemed to answer our needs, thanks to the navigation (guesswork?) of some stalwarts of the party. When we eventually got back to the estate it has to be confessed that a few were not too proud to catch a lift back to the cottages!

The next day dawned a little dull and drizzly, although the sunshine returned in the afternoon. Quite a number went off to Skye and inspected the Old Man of Storr; others were happily lazy and inspected the gardens instead! The Hellens retrieved their

car from a garage in Ballachulish where a suspension spring had been replaced.

Tuesday saw some 9 members of the party ascend Sgurr na Feartaig from Craig (beyond Achnashellach) on the stalkers' path. The day was absolutely beautiful, but like all others cold when out of the sun.

Wednesday was designated as a special day dedicated to the memory of Dave Lindsey who sadly died suddenly just before last Christmas. Tony Gilby, a member of the Munro Society had booked 2 Munros, Sgurr Rhuadh and Beinn Liath Mhor to be climbed in memory of Dave. It should be explained that the Munro Society have this year, its 10th year, the objective of climbing all the Munros and society members are invited to climb - and book to do - peaks of their choosing. Liz, Dave's widow, very nobly carried a suitable liquid tribute to the pass between the 2 peaks where 14 of the meet's members drank to Dave's memory and all that the mountains had meant to him. Trey and Michael did the traverse of Beinn Liath Mhor before joining us at the pass. Then 6 of us climbed Sgurr Rhuadh whilst the others walked back to Achnashellach, after which Liz and Tony descended in the direction of the pass in order to traverse Beinn Liath Mhor as Tony had to do this peak, being the Munro Society member. By then the day was quite advanced and it was 9.15pm before they returned to the Attadale cottages!

Wednesday evening brought the power failure that resulted next morning in our invitation from the laird to breakfast in the big house. Applecross seemed to be the destination of the day after breakfast – some did some walking from the top of the Bealach na Ba, whilst others enjoyed an excellent lunch at the Applecross pub!

Our week ended with another very pleasant excursion from Achnashellach – up the hill in the direction of the pass we had been to on Wednesday, then a round down a delightful valley past what must be one of

### News from Members

## The Battens in the Apennines

Last September found us in the northern Apennines between Bologna and Florence on another Inntravel hotel-to-hotel walking holiday. We did the shorter three day option followed a week or so later by Joy and John Parsons who did the full six day version.

The peaks in this section of the Apennines rise to just over 2000m with the lower slopes a mix of farming and woodland. Above 1000m there are beech and pine forests while above 1500m there is heathland.

Our starting point was the small town of Poretta Terme which we reached by train after flying into Bologna. The first day was the 10km walk up to the village of Lizzano in Belvedere- day sacs only plus the ample picnic lunches provided as our luggage was moved from hotel to hotel. As we climbed we could look down on Poretta in the valley and up towards the higher slopes. The next day a short transfer put us on our way to Monte Belvedere (1139m) via the so-called 'Freedom Path'. Monte Belvedere was one of the key points in the German defensive line across northern Italy- the Gothic Line-

and it was assaulted and captured in February 1945 by US troops and Italian partisans.

The summit still shows signs of the German positions and there is a monument to the American mountain division involved. From here we dropped down to the slightly higher village of Vidiciatico. The third day of walking started with a longer transfer from Vidiciatico up the road which serves the ski area on the slopes of Corno alle Scale (1944m). We were dropped at the Refugio Carvone and climbed up through the trees to gain the ridge at Passo del Vallone. To the right was the very steep northern side of Corno alle Scale with its latticework cross on the top and to the left was our objective: the rounded and bare summit of the appropriately named La Nuda (1828m). From there it was a long descent back into the trees to reach a broad logging track through a beech forest which finally led back towards Vidiciatico. This was a long hot day: 12 km with about 550m of ascent but with over 1100m of descent to return to the village.

We had one short rain shower on their first day but otherwise the weather was dry, sunny and warm. Flies were troublesome lower down but disappeared nearer the tops. The hotels were welcoming and comfortable with excellent food- an Inntravel speciality. Most of the paths were clearly waymarked with CAI numbers. The relevant map is Regione Emilia-Romagna/CAI carta escursionistica 1:25000 06BO 'Parco del Corno alle Scale'. ## Not snowshoeing in the Auvergne

Having been snowshoeing in the Vanoise for the past four years (see our report in the last Newsletter), we decided to have a change of scene in 2011. Some French friends had enjoyed a week of snowshoeing last year in the Auvergne region of the Massif Central and on their recommendation we made a booking at the same hotel for the end of January: the Gite-Hotel Bellevue at Laveissière which is a few kilometres west of Murat and close to the ski resort of Super-Lioran at the foot of Plomb du Cantal, the highest point in the area at 1855 m. We were collected from Murat by one of the hotel minibuses after traveling by train from Birmingham via London, Paris and Clermont-Ferrand.

The Cantal area of the Auvergne is one of woodlands, high pastures and moorland topped by peaks- puys- which are the remnants of ancient volcanoes [ed: and verv nice cheese]. The hotel offered two walks each day to cater for different levels of fitness. Each group carried between them the very substantial picnic lunch provided: every day a different homemade soup and meat plus bread, cheese, fruit and chocolate or cake. On several days we were driven to the start/finish of a circular walk and one day we were able to do a through walk by having transport to the start and then being collected at the finish- one advantage of being with an organised group. We were usually back at the hotel by 5 pm to enjoy mulled wine before the substantial evening meal which during the week included several regional specialities. Our guide clearly knew the local terrain very well and was able to tell us much about the geology, wildlife and farming of the area.

Whilst there was quite a lot of snow, there was not enough to make use of snowshoes- so we walked instead. The weather was mainly fine and sunny although very cold. As a result of the low temperatures, there were many spectacular

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frozen waterfalls and streams and several times we were forced to make detours because of paths being sheets of smooth ice. In all, we walked some 35 miles with about 10,000 ft of ascent.

We had very poor weather during our previous walking in the Auvergne in August 2004 (see our report in Newsletter No. 204) and this time there was not enough snow to use raquettes although this is always a risk at this relatively low altitude. Nevertheless, we enjoyed our week very much. The current owners of the Bellevue will be leaving at the end of March but we understand that the new owners will be continuing to offer the same programme: look at <a href="https://www.montagnebellevue.com">www.montagnebellevue.com</a> if you are interested or contact us for more information.

In summary we agreed/discussed the following:


- That we should proceed with a training programme for club members in 2013 as a result of the success of the 2012 programme.
