Draft minutes of the 70th Annual General meeting of the University of London Graduate Mountaineering Club, held at Plas-y-Brenin at 6.30 pm on Saturday 16th April 2022.

- **1 c) Minutes.** A motion to accept the draft minutes of the 2018 AGM was proposed by Frances Mott, seconded by Elanor Mott and agreed by consensus.

A motion to accept the draft minutes of the 2019 AGM was proposed by Elena Charalambous, seconded by Pauline Owens and agreed by consensus.

1 d) President's report

Recent years had been challenging, due to shortage of club officers, Covid and personal issues, but the future looked promising. Thanks were due to Heather, Keith and Sue for getting things back up and to Mike Esten and others for advice and support.

Membership

Memberships had stopped being processed in 2020 and nothing had been done in 2021, but memberships were now being accepted and processed as usual.

No membership cards were printed in 2020, 2021 or 2022. Printing and posting these is a large administrative effort costing c £150 (against an income of c £400pa for 100 members). The new committee will review alternatives, including electronic.

BMC has announced that affiliation cost will rise in line with inflation and this will be reflected in ULGMC membership fees as decided by the 2019 AGM. Latest prices are on the webpage.

In line with previous AGM decisions, a clear distinction is being made between club and BMC elements of the club subscription. There is no alternative to BMC affiliation for liability insurance, including cover for the committee and huts, plus overall support for climbing and walking nationally. Those with multiple BMC membership should remember to reclaim.

The 2019 AGM had endorsed Mike Esten's proposal that the club write to the BMC, outlining the large proportional cost of BMC affiliation and our concern that it will reduce the number of people able to join mountaineering clubs. This is in hand and will be pursued by the new committee.

Meets

We need members to run and attend meets, official and unofficial. Thanks to the Motts for the 2021 Cornwall, Bonfire and New Year meets, and Heather for the Surrey walk. The 2022 meets list is in the newsletter and on the webpage. Again thanks to the Motts for achieving this.

Hut bookings

Fallcliffe and Caseg Fraith closed temporarily due to Covid restrictions in 2020 and put adjustments in place in 2021. Both huts are now fully open with no or minor adjustments.

Fallcliffe has been refurbished; thanks to everyone who made this happen.

Please use the website to book huts; the site has latest information and contact details for the wardens.

AGMs and club governance

The 2020 AGM in 2020 at Easter at Caseg was cancelled because of Covid, and there was a hiatus in club arrangements. But we are now back in Wales in the spirit of decisions reached at the 2019 AGM, and back on track as a club.

It is important that the committee acts in the best interests of club members. This means the committee should keep members informed and members should provide input and hold the committee to account. To give the new committee time to put forward proposals to members, I will suggest under item 4b a further AGM in October.

Committee

To help get back on track, in 2021 I appointed Keith Mott as membership and meets secretary, Heather Rumble as secretary and Sue Darling as vice president. My thanks to them.

We have since had three volunteers/nominations. Subject to elections under item 6, for the first time in 4-5 years we should have a proper working committee.

We are also engaging with current ULMC members and alumni to encourage their involvement with ULGMC, not only to ensure our future, but also to promote their climbing and mountaineering ambitions.

Club accounts

We lost access to NatWest online banking in early 2020 as they changed from institutional accounts to personal accounts. It took almost 9 months to get this sorted, which took a lot of time and affected processing memberships. We have access back and the ability to make bank transfers, which has simplified some club admin. NatWest credited the club with £100 to apologise.

In this process we found zombie signatories who had not been removed as requested. There are currently 2 signatories, from the same household, which will be addressed by the new committee.

We also finally recovered missing paperwork covering financial years 2013-2014. Mark Stitson has now scrutinised the accounts from 2013/14 to 2021.

Previous AGMs requested a list of honorary & life members, to review our liabilities of BMC affiliation. When I took on treasurer I had no information on the differences between lifetime members, honorary members and honorary Vice Presidents. Therefore we have paid BMC insurance for all of them (and their spouses) even though this is not necessarily what the constitution or prior AGM decisions say. This wasn't an issue when we could cover these costs via 10 paying members,

but given the increased cost (and proportion) of BMC affiliation, we now need income from 40 paying members to cover.

Jill Bennett (our archivist) compiled a list, but this hasn't been reviewed by Heather and the committee until recently. If we haven't done so already we will consult with all beneficiaries to ensure we get this right for the 2023 fy. We will also add a list of known honorary members/VPs and the reason they were appointed to the webpage to ensure their past contributions are more visible.

ULMC future

This was a key focus over the pandemic. In 2020 London University moved to dissolve Student Central (the funding body for University clubs) and encouraged clubs to approach college organisations. Student clubs objected and we asked ULGMC members to write letters of support, which helped achieve a short term reprieve.

Statement by Lucas Wing, President of ULMC.

ULMC had been looking actively for another structure in which to work, with options of linking with a college club or becoming an independent charity. Agreement had now been reached to link to Birkbeck College, while maintaining the separate identity of ULMC and affiliation with the BMC, plus affiliation with a commercial transport organisation. This seemed a good way ahead.

After recent elections, the club had a full committee. 1 trip a month was planned, using hired transport on a self-funding basis. Past meets included Caseg, Scotland in winter and Cornwall; pictures were shown.

ULMC had appreciated funding from ULGMC for overseas climbing and would apply for future Alps meets.

Communications

No <u>newsletter</u> in 2020 and 2021, as no contributions received. With a bigger committee, it's the intention to have 2-3 a year plus more active social media and an enhanced website.

Email. Yahoo keep changing rules around mass emailing, so I'm exploring a different provider.

<u>Website.</u> Over the last 2-3 years we have tweaked the structure and added content. We had an issue with the certificate, now resolved. I plan further improvements, e.g. state our privacy/GDPR policy and add a newsletter archive.

Constitutional review

The pandemic, reduced AGM attendance since 2017/28 and advice from previous AGMs have highlighted the need to amend our constitution (which is on the webpage under "About us"). In the run up to the next GM I will review the constitution and put proposals in a n/I with a view getting input from members and adopting an amended constitution at a General meeting.

70th club and hut anniversary

Sadly the 70th club and hut anniversary passed without notice, but perhaps we can mark the 75th or 80th event.

Conclusion

9.5 years as an officer on the committee has been quite a ride. It's a mixed legacy and I am looking forward to have others take on these key roles and to concentrate on a few things I can contribute more easily to the club at this point.

3. Finances & membership

a) Report on membership numbers and profile

Membership numbers were reasonably stable between 2014-2019 (180 - 181 - 173 - 180 - 174 - 161).

2020: 102 members (mostly via Direct Debit as no reminder was sent)

2021: 33 (no Direct Debit collected or reminders sent, figure includes officers/trustees/wardens)

2022: 103 and will have a handful more

Proportion of people born after 1980 has increased from about 15% in 2014/15 to 38% this year

b) (Re)presentation and adoption of scrutinised accounts for 2014-2018

There had been no changes to accounts since they were first presented to AGMs, but paperwork holdups had prevented them being scrutinised.

2014-2015: papers received and now scrutinised by Mark Stitson

2016-2018: scrutinised by Mark Stitson after last (2019) AGM.

A motion to accept the scrutinised accounts for 2014 – 2018 was proposed by Andy Charalambous, seconded by Frances Mott and agreed by consensus.

c) Presentation and adoption of accounts for 2019-2021

2019 was the last year of donation to 5 organisations (2019 AGM agreed that only 2 Mountain Rescue organisations should receive donations in future). Training fund was £420, including £20 membership from the late John Coote. Committee expenses covered membership cards, printing and postage. There had been a small loss on the 2019 AGM - VAT wasn't collected from everyone as Plas y Brenin had quoted a price without VAT.

2020: No donation, no training fund

2021: No donation, no training fund and essentially no membership collected.

A motion to accept the scrutinised accounts for 2019 – 2021 was proposed by Elanor Mott, seconded by Elena Charalambous and agreed by consensus.

d) Presentation of forecast for 2022

<u>Budget projections</u> were put forward to inform members and help forward planning. The BMC element of the club subscription had gone to the BMC so members were covered. MR donations would continue (£200) as would the training fund (basic £200, could be £400 to help with ULMC overseas meet). Hire of PyB hall for AGM = £102 plus guest meals as agreed by 2019 AGM. This would mean a deficit of £200, but allowing for liabilities there would be £6,500 in the bank so this seemed acceptable.

No questions or objection raised.

e) Membership subscription rates (club contribution & BMC affiliation) for 2022 & 2023. It was proposed to keep the club element of the members subscription the same, pending future consideration by the new committee: £2 for the first two years after joining, £6 for singles, £10 for joint.

The BMC element of members' subscription rates would follow BMC charges, as agreed by 2019 AGM. Current BMC rates: £21 for adults, £17.35 for students, £15.55 for U18, £10.50 for renewals in Q3&Q4

Overall club membership subscription (for adults): £23 (first 2 years); £27 (single); £52 (joint). Members who may not be liable for the full BMC rate should contact the membership secretary so records can be amended.

Subscription rates were approved by consensus.

f) Authorisation of extraordinary expenditure for 2022 & 2023

Expenditure around £50-£150 was forecast in line with agreement of previous AGMs, including expenses incurred in running the club - printing and postage of membership cards and other documents (e.g. newsletter archive); costs of banking and using GoCardless to process Direct Debits. The club also covers losses meet leaders may incur from cancellations.

The Expedition and Training fund had contributed to ULMC Alps meets, helping ULGMC and ULMC members develop from climbers to mountaineers. The committee strongly recommend renewing the Fund for 2022. ULMC were hoping for a 2022 Alps meet with a hired guide for basic training. There was a unanimous vote for continuation of the Fund.

Donations to mountain rescue

Proposed £200 donation as before, split between the Mountain Rescue Council of England and Wales and Mountain Rescue Scotland. Agreed by unanimous vote.

AGM dinner for ULMC committee in 2022

To be decided later in the year.

4. Programme for 2022 & 2023

a) Meets report & planning

Thanks to the Mott family and Heather for arranging meets. Keith Mott outlined plans for 2022 and 2023: 6 regular meets plus hopes for more; more integration of ULGMC and ULMC meets.

b) Date of 2023 AGM/next general meeting

The Chair proposed a virtual AGM in October 2022, to consider proposals from the new Committee including date of the 2023 AGM. The following points were made in discussion:

- An EGM would be more appropriate, and should have a defined purpose, notified in advance.
- The powers of an EGM were limited, and did not extend to setting an AGM date
- Allowance should be made for current circumstances of the Club
- No reason why the current meeting could not decide the next AGM

The Committee informed the AGM that they wished to call an EGM in accordance with para 16 of the Constitution, to take place virtually on 13 October. Purpose to discuss outstanding business, detailed agenda to be circulated at least 4 weeks in advance. The meeting took note.

A motion to convene the 2023 AGM on Saturday 8 April in N Wales was proposed by Frances Mott, seconded by Elena Charalambous and agreed by consent.

5. Other reports

As warden for Caseg Fraith, Phil Tarr reported that in spite of Covid closures and restrictions, Caseg did well financially thanks to a £16k Covid grant from Conwy Council. Parking fees were now charged, and fees for individual dormitories. ??A new water treatment system had been recommended by Conwy Council, due to corroded pipes. There were ongoing cistern issues. Permission was awaited for path repairs.

The 5 yearly electrical inspection had taken place and work was needed including a new circuit board. There was 1 year left of a 2 year electricity contract, but Caseg was likely to have to put up rates. There were issues with power being left on; this might be remedied by thermostats/smart meters when 5G was installed, due in the autumn.

There were surpluses of £5000 in 2019, £8000 in 2020, £10,000 in 2021 and £5000 this year so far. The Fallcliffe loan had been increased by/to £10,000.

Thanks to everyone who had worked at Caseg, especially Keith, Mark and Sally.

Thanks were expressed to Jill Bennett , Club archivist, for her continuing service.

University Of London Mountaineering Club

Alps Trip 2022Ecrins National Park




After a year of UK based trips it was time to head abroad for our final trip of the academic year. The location this time was Ailefroide, a village in the Ecrins national park in the French Alps. The location was chosen as it offered something for all members regardless of interest or experience; from high alpine routes, long sport climbs to sunny crags and scenic hikes.

Overview of Activities

We all arrived at the campsite via different methods and from different places (including a selection of different countries!). We spent the first two days familiarising ourselves with the campsite and local valley rock: a popular route ascended by a few teams was *Palavar-les-flots*, a 12 pitch granite slab fest that is typical of Ailefroide.





Friday 3rd July saw the arrival of Vincent: a local guide who was to spend 2 days teaching us safe glacier travel and crevasse rescue. Before being unleashed on the glacier we spent a morning ascending trees and practising our ropework in the campsite. The first test of fitness began with a hike up the winding trail to the Refuge du Glacier Blanc, where we ate a 4 course meal and gave many of our members their first experience of an Alpine hut. Not quite Caseg but it'll do.





The following day saw the crampons and axes out as we headed out onto the beautiful Glacier Blanc where Vincent showed us the technicalities of crevasses rescue with the surprisingly simple method of telling us to "jump in and try to get out". Aside from a few initial "total failures", we all eventually understood that crevasses are not so different to trees and could now travel safely on the glacier. His work done, Vincent sprinted off down the hill into the Ecrins wilderness.



Armed with this new knowledge, Lucas, grande Gavin and Callum headed up to the Refuge Ecrins after a quick ascent of the *Pic du Glacier d'Arsine*. After an early start and an actual crevasse rescue, they climbed the *Roche Faurio*: a 3730m peak with a stunning summit ridge. Meanwhile, the rest of the group returned to the valley for some cragging and long sport adventures: James and Chris climbed *L'interminable agonie du chamois*, Faiz and grande Gavin climbed *Spit on Cup* before attempting to donate a rope to the crag. 7th July saw a two pronged assault by Lucas/Jenny and Callum/Petite Gavin on the *Fissure d'Ailefroide*: an irresistible 300m crack visible from the campsite. Other valley routes sent by the club included: *Cascade blues*, a route with a waterfall traverse, *Riviere Kwai*, featuring an improvised bridge, and the aptly named routes *Carambal Mais c'est du VI* and *Ma*, *que! Seulment du VI*.





After an avalanche of sends in the valley the club members started to get sick of the soupy valley air and a return to the high alps was planned. Two teams of Juan/Jenny/Mara/petite Gavin and Lucas/Callum ascended back to the Glacier blanc on the morning of 10th July. While Lucas/Callum traversed the amazing *Pointe de Cineastes*, Juan/Jenny/Mara/petite Gavin embarked on a record slowest ascent of the incredible south ridge of the *Pic du Glacier Blanc*. News of their record time even reached the Refuge, where Lucas and Callum had to ensure with all their English charm that the increasingly grumpy hut guardian would hold their dinner. Lucas/Callum and the now world expert on the south ridge of the *Pic du Glacier Blanc* Jenny (at least in terms of time spent) returned to the ridge the next day for a disappointingly quicker ascent.





The final few days in Ailefroide saw the dual threat of tiredness and the French school holidays reduce the rate of climbing in the club and an increase in trips to the village bar. La cocarde and Mars were climbed as well as another assault on the Fissure d'Ailefroide by James/Juan at the cost of a suncream disaster. With the traditional Wednesday pizza on 13th July to end the trip, club members departed the next day either for home or onward to Chamonix.





Members comments

Our members had lots to say about this trip, here is a short piece written by KCL student Jenny:

"Finally, ULMC is back in their natural habitat! What would a mountaineering club do without actual mountains?

It's time for some high peaks, shrinking glaciers, cosy alpine huts and long multi pitch climbs after all the short and rainy British trad.

And no doubt, the French Alps in the Ecrins Massif deserve their name and wouldn't let us down. Loads of fabulous summits were climbed, even though the impressive Barre des Ecrins and Pelvoux have to wait for another year with more snow and a better crevasse situation.

It was my first ULMC trip, but definitely not the last one - how could I say no to a week in the Alps?! And all the trouble with french trains, strikes and unplanned nights in Paris was definitely worth it: what a great trip!

High mountains, good climbs, sweaty ascends, scary descends, long trad routes and even looonger alpine routes. But no day is too long with the right people around - huge thanks to the fabulous ULMC gang! And how could a fantastic climbing day end better than with a swim in the freezing glacier lake, a cold beer and a crackling campfire. Not to forget all the late-night tent shenanigans.
