Grande Traversée du Mercantour Stephen Olivant



Last September I was invited to join a really friendly group to trek a slightly shortened version of the 16 day Grand Traverse which runs along the central spine of the Alpes-Maritimes as it arcs southeastwards to Menton on the Mediterranean coast. The first half of GR 52 route follows the French-Italian border, and the second half runs through the French Mercantour National Park.

The Alpes-Maritimes are stunningly beautiful mountains and quiet in September because they are comparatively unknown, even in France. They also enjoy generally sunnier and warmer conditions than the central alps.



We had to cut a couple days off either end of the whole Grand Traverse to fit it into a two week holiday and we were happy to concentrate upon the high mountain sections for 13 days. The GR52 was well marked and the route obvious for most of the trip, although a couple of unmarked deviations were necessary to avoid temporary hazards.

Our overnight stays were in a mixture of French and Italian alpine club huts, plus a couple of small hotels and one huge Christian sanctuary. Having a fluent French-speaker amongst us helped a lot in a couple of the huts. All of them were very welcoming and provided good food for evening meals and packed lunches. As our party consisted of six attractive single women (plus me), we seemed to get extra attention and hospitality from the hut guardians.

The weather was wonderfully sunny for the trip until our penultimate day developed into a wet afternoon and overnight snowstorm. However, the next morning brought clear blue skies and crisp white snow underfoot for our long walk out of the high mountains to our taxi and celebration beers at a valley head.



If you are thinking about where to go for your next high mountain trekking trip in Europe, I would recommend looking at the Mercantour. Flights to Nice, car hire and public transport are all relatively easy and cheap. I loved this GR and would go back sometime.... but the Alta Via 2 in the Dolomites has caught my attention for this year.

Electric Cars at Caseg?

The government intends to ban the sale of petrol, diesel and hybrid cars from 2040 onwards. Then from 2035, and most recently from 2032. What impact is this likely to have on those of us wishing to visit Caseg, or Fallcliffe? Trying not to be parochial, the effects of such a ban will have a huge impact on anyone wanting to go away any distance for a weekend.

Let's get specific and talk about going from London to Caseg. As I understand it, the distance capacity of electric care is at a maximum about 250 miles. Doesn't leave much for running around from hut to crag - say, the Anglesey sea cliffs or Cwm Silyn. The ultimate prize is a battery that will do about 500 miles, but there seems little prospect of that as yet.

A w/e at Caseg can be divided into "getting there and back" and "being there"

"Getting there" It's approximately 200 miles from "London" - probably Marble Arch or Trafalgar Square - to Capel Curig and unless you're juiced up before you leave you'll need to do so en route. Adds time to the journey, and just think about all the cars queuing up at the Shell garage at the end of the Gobowen (Oswestry) bypass: Again, subject to advances in technology, it is likely to take at least 10 times as long to juice up as to fill with petrol. And it's far too soon to say where all the filling stations might be. It's possible, though, that juicing points can be developed which are completely independent of a human presence, which might be OK for the provider but wouldn't reduce the filling time.



Assuming you arrive there with the battery not totally exhausted, one of the first things to do would be to find a filling station. Again, we've no idea where these are likely to be, but just imagine the filling capacity needed for all the cars parked along the A5 in the Ogwen Valley, and at Pen y Pass, and

Nant Peris it doesn't take much imagining to see that places like these would do well out of creating a filling station, but someone will have to stay behind to supervise the filling of the tank, and then catch everyone else up - or just go to somewhere different for the day.

There's not much more to say, really. The problem isn't unique to the outdoor industry, and there must be people elsewhere who have begun to think about it. Does anyone have a view?

Editor's Comment

Since my real job involves trying to find ways for us all to be a bit more sustainable, I couldn't really not comment on this one.

I'm frustrated by how slow the development of the infrastructure for electric cars is taking, but also have to remind myself that uptake in buying them has also been reasonably slow; While electric car sales are growing, so too are the sales of gas guzzling SUVs. I suppose it is a chicken and egg problem, as Tim is pointing out, but I also think that lots of the problems we are currently pointing out would be solved if we supported the industry better early on. It's really difficult though; Personally, we would love an electric car but don't have a driveway where we could charge it and there are no charge points near us. So there are already significant barriers even for the dedicated.

That said, I'm not convinced that there is no way around this in what is a transitional time for the UK transport industry, and it is possible right now to get to Caseg without owning a carbon emitting vehicle, leaving budget to invest now in an electric car. For years we didn't own a car and instead rented one when we wanted to visit the mountains. It was actually pretty affordable and was a fun experience driving the most up to date (and fuel efficient!) motors; perhaps this is a solution for those with

shorter range electric cars in the interim. And over the years, as our guilt about the "love miles" we spend on mountaineering has increased, we've tried to do more on foot or by bus once we get to Caseg, or have tried to car share with others. We've had plenty of excellent weekends at Caseg without moving the car at all. Lastly, most Caseg meets have at least a few members arriving by train and bus, especially as Londoners give up their cars for public transport. I hope that with a few adjustments and a little inconvenience now, we might see a very different world in the next decade and I might be able to feel less guilty for driving seven hours North just to go for a walk! Electric cars are just part of the infrastructure that's needed to revolutionise UK transport, but without some open-mindedness now, it won't happen.

Devoured by the Dragon

Many of you will know that Stephan and I had been preparing for some years to pit our legs and navigation skills against The Dragon's Back Race this year. The race starts in Conwy and takes five days, following a 315km route across the Welsh mountains. It takes you over 15,500m of ascent before finishing in Llandeilo. We spent every bit of holiday in 2019 reccying the route, running in frost at 6am, leaving hire cars all over remote parts of Wales and sometimes wild camping in waist high heather.

Anyway, the race finally came and we stood on the start line in Conwy Castle with lots of very serious-looking ultra runners. I felt totally sick with nerves, but we soon eased into it and tried to ignore all the people overtaking us. We did a good time on Day 1, reaching the camp after around 12 hours of running and a brilliant traverse over Crib Goch in the late evening sun. As sods law will enforce itself, a mystery knee injury presented itself right at the start

though and didn't budge (and it hasn't come back since), so every descent was a slow slog.

That knee injury was to prove our downfall on Day 2. We made good progress over the Moelwyns and Rhinogs, but descending down into Dollgellau was painfully slow and we limped into camp right against the 14 hour cut off. We made it, but only just and I didn't think we would be able to start Day 3.



As it happened, we were bullied by several support crew, including ULGMC's very own Sam, into starting Day 3 and were actually on really good form. There was mist over Cadair Idris, which really helped as the heat had been doing us no good. But at some point my body gave up and the miles took their toll; I could only walk and felt ill every time I ran. We got slower and slower until eventually we knew we wouldn't make the half-way point in time. As the course planner said, "The course closed on us" and we were forced to retire having made about half the distance and over half the ascent – crossing all of Snowdonia National Park.

We're not too disappointed as we think we gave it our absolute all. But it is unfinished business perhaps... The next edition is in September 2021; will we be any fitter by then? The ULGMC Name

I first stayed at Caseg in November 1964. I had gone there with the college club (LSE), using what was then the usual means of transport, a hired minibus. Always difficult, finding a driver old enough to satisfy the insurance conditions imposed by the hire companies - but that's another story.

The main reason for remembering the visit was the behaviour of our president. He was a committed socialist, a hard left-winger whose father had been black-listed from the north-eastern shipyards prewar, and who had something of a log on his shoulder. What follows is from my fallible memory, but the notion must have come from somewhere, so this is as good as any other, and more likely than most.

On the notice-board was a bit of paper inviting you, when you graduated and left the university, to join the London Graduate Mountaineering Club. There followed details of the membership secretary, the meets programme, and so on. For some reason our president thought this was promoting elitism, and with some difficulty was dissuaded by more sober

members of the club from tearing it down and throwing it away.

However, the LGMC name has stuck in my mind. There have been informal discussions with current ULGMC members about how to get more members, and the name has been amongst the matters considered. It is my belief that the name is one of the more off-putting elements, and I want to suggest that the name is changed to the shorter, simpler version.

How, then, did it ever become ULGMC? This happened around the time I joined, I was living in France, and no, I don't remember the name of the organisation I joined, though I think it most likely that it was LGMC.I believe that when the club was thinking of buying a property in the Peak District, it approached the University and asked for a loan to help. The request reached the Senate, who pointed out that with a name of LGMC there was no apparent connection between the climbing club and the University of London. So we changed our name to ULGMC - and the Senate gave us the loan. Now this might be a complete figment of my imagination, though I think not; and in any case, doesn't weaken the case for a name change now.

The University of London is nowadays almost a figment of the imagination. People identify with the colleges, which nowadays award their own degrees - the larger ones at least - and public references to them, whether on University Challenge or elsewhere, are to 'Queen Mary University' or 'Royal Holloway University' with no mention of London at all.

A name change might make it easier to attract new members. We need to approach, in the Spring term, I think, all the colleges with their own clubs, with a flier about LGMC and the huts and a forthcoming meets list. The flier should be in two parts, one with long-term stability to if - the huts, trustees and

(probably) club officials, and one with more transitory information like the meets programme.

Changing the name shouldn't be that difficult, but will need to be done with care and after discussion with and agreement from the bank. When we changed the old constitution about 15 years ago, the bank wanted to see copies of the old and proposed new constitutions, the voting figures at the AGM and (maybe) what arrangements are being made for postal votes for non-attenders. These matters should be able to be cleared up by talking to the local manager. Come to think of it, if you send me account name, number and sort code - if you think changing the name is a good idea - then I'll see what I can do through our local NatWest branch.



Massive hike in BMC affiliation costs

Some of you may have heard that in 2019 the BMC raised it's affiliation costs by a whopping 35%, raising our affiliation per member to £20.25 each. The reason given was that the BMC had, for the first time ever we believe, had to pay out on an insurance claim. There was a lively debate about this at the 2019 AGM and ULGMC are resigned that it will have to be paid, as it is our national body and provides us with a range of services, including insurance, that would be very difficult to obtain

elsewhere. So we have raised membership prices in accordance. As suggested at the AGM, we will be making it clearer on membership application forms and our membership cards how much of members subs go to us and how much go to the BMC. Interested in joining the committee?

Here's a brief description of the committee roles available at the moment in ULGMC.

The current committee do most of their "meetings" virtually at the moment, because we are quite geographically spread. Very occasionally, we will arrange a weekend away to discuss club issues. We all try to attend the AGM if possible. Each committee is different though, and finds their best way of working.

Treasurer/Membership Secretary

An hour a week, plus committee meetings (usually one or two per year, not including the AGM).

The treasurer and membership secretary's role is to collate and process membership requests and to supply our membership numbers quarterly to the BMC. In addition, the treasurer and membership secretary organises our expenditure, which is usually small amounts of money used to support meet leaders.

This job suits someone who can dedicate a small amount of time each week. There is not a huge

amount of work, but it comes in steadily throughout the year.

Secretary

An hour a month, plus committee meetings (usually one or two per year, not including the AGM).

The secretary's role is to organise the rest of the committee. This means keeping a calendar of events and reminding other committee members when deadlines are coming up. The secretary also organises committee meetings and takes notes at these and the AGM. Traditionally, the secretary has also been responsible for putting together the newsletter – however this varies from committee to committee.

Draft Minutes for 69th AGM (2019)

The 69th Annual General Meeting of the University of London Mountaineering Club (ULGMC) was held at 6.30pm on Friday 19th April 2019 at Plas y Brenin, Snowdonia.

Opening (presented by Secretary)

Stephan Tietz (President) in the chair (and covering Secretary); Heather Rumble (interim Secretary) taking minutes

Apologies for absence

Heather Rumble had not included an appeal to ULMC/ULGMC to help with Caseg. Rollover.

ACTION: Heather Rumble to present to 2020 AGM.

President's report

President has focussed on four areas:

- Revisiting governance of club, particularly ensure the AGM works for members
- Engage the next generation of climbers, particularly ULMC
- Deal with increasing cost of BMC affiliation
- Support Fallcliffe, so it becomes a more welcoming and enjoyable hut

We have made some progress across the board, but have also seen some setbacks even though the last AGM is only 6 months ago.

^{*}Adoption of the draft agenda for 2019 AGM

On the note of AGM, I proposed to move the date to coincide with Easter. We will see how the evening and the weekend develops, but I am cautiously optimistic. We have similar attendance to last year and attendees are a more representative crosscut of our membership. So, I am hopeful that we can build on this if we have a year to plan the next AGM.

This obviously also means that we have had a very mild success in engaging the next generation of climbers even though ULMC attendance on this meet is not as large as I had hoped. But we are moving in the right direction.

At this point I would like to read from our constitution: "The objects of the club shall be the promotion and encouragement of all branches of mountaineering, hillwalking and climbing, especially among its members and students and graduates of the University of London." You know that we have already started to direct support in this direction using the Expedition and Training Fund. We also received a proposal with regards to membership fees which would help younger members who (fresh out of University) try to continue climbing will also struggle with their first Council Tax bill.

Now, when I said that I would like to deal with the increasing cost of BMC affiliation, I didn't expect the whopper of announcement for the 2020 affiliation costs. A 30% increase! Well, for now we will have to swallow this bitter pill I fear I am so far not aware of a true alternative either.

Finally, I know that the trustees have been working hard on a plan for Fallcliffe. I will try and stay in touch with them and will keep an eye on the clubs finances to see if we can give some financial support in the future, but I am also looking for volunteers who would consider helping with more direct fundraising including applying for grants.

Finances

Stephan Tietz (President) presented as Ian Ross (Treasurer) not able to attend.

Report on membership numbers and profile

Membership numbers, since 2014: 180 - 181 - 173 - 180 and 174 at the end of last year. So, the total has been quite stable while at the same time the proportion of people born after 1980 has increased from 10% to 25%.

However, for 2019 we currently have 148 people signed up. We normally get another 10 members renewing/joining throughout the year, which would still cause a shortfall of 16. This includes both very longstanding members not renewing as well as a members who joined within the last 5 years. I can't make out a systematic pattern.

(Re)presentation of scrutinised accounts for 2014-2017

Stephan Tietz provided update on actions from 2018 AGM:

- Accounts for 2014-2015 not scrutinised as paperwork was not received from Mike Warden, was chased 5+ times via telephone and email, letter not yet written
- Accounts for 2016-2017 scrutinised by Mark Stitson, who believes they are in order
- Accounts for 2014-2017 have not changed and have not been printed for AGM to see, though they have been seen at previous AGM's and have not changed.

*Adoption of scrutinised accounts for 2014-2017

Adoption of accounts was discussed:

AGM requested that committee attempts to do some scrutiny of accounts for 2014-2015

ACTION: Stephan Tietz to provide Mark Stitson with copies of bank statements and receipts for 2014-2015 to attempt scrutiny of accounts for 2014-2015.

AGM did not want to adopt accounts without sight (even though they had not changed)

ACTION: Committee to circulate accounts for 2014-2017 and present to 2020 AGM.

Presentation of accounts for 2018

Stephan Tietz summarised accounts for 2018:

• 2018 income and expenditure almost identical to 2017. No AGM dinners for ULMC, increased Training and Expedition Fund and changed printer for membership cards so committee expenses were less

- Small surplus of £33
- Increase in members paying by Direct Debit, which is collected in November which can be seen under "prepaid subscriptions" under liabilities. Finally, started using BMC funding for webpage and wrote cheque for committee expenses, so we are getting these liabilities off the books

Mike Esten pointed out that the accounts do not make it clear enough that a substantial portion of the membership fee goes straight to the BMC and proposed that in future, BMC contributions are separated out as a separate income stream.

ACTION: Treasurer (Ian Ross) to adopt changes for 2020 accounts.

*Adoption of accounts for 2018

The scrutineer (Mark Stitson) confirmed that the accounts for 2018 are in order. Adoption of accounts was put to vote.

11 members were for, 0 were against, 0 abstained (proxy vote not possible). The accounts were adopted.

Presentation of forecast for 2019

The forecast shows a larger deficit than previous years. This is driven by the slight drop and membership numbers and will likely be nearer to c£200 at the end of the year. However, the club is likely to see a larger deficit over the coming years unless we decrease our expenditure and/or increase our income. The main increase in expenditure has been the rise of BMC club membership and the introduction of the Training and Expedition fund (of £400/year since 2017).

So far the club has run an annual surplus and/or only a small deficit due to one-off income boosts (e.g. c£100 in donations in 2018) or unexpectedly reduced expenditure (e.g. c£100 savings from late renewals which reduced our affiliation costs with BMC in 2018 and c£50 savings as ULMC committee did not uptake the AGM dinner invite in 2017-2018). This is reflected in the forecast for 2019 which predicts a shortfall of c£385 which would reduce the clubs assets to c£5200.

Our assets are large enough (a previous AGM agreed that two years of BMC subs should be held in reserve), so the committee have no immediate concern, but now is a good time to start addressing the balance between income and expenditure.

*Membership subscription rates for 2020

Stephan Tietz gave an overview of previous years membership subscription rates:

- Last raise in 2014 to cover increase in BMC membership
- BMC membership was raised again in 2018 but ULGMC rates were kept the same. The income shortfall of c£160 was covered by the club's annual surplus.
- Stephan Tietz announced that the BMC club membership will now rise by £6/head (£20.25 normal, £15 students). He stated that there is currently no alternative to our BMC affiliation which provides members of the club with liability insurance (in particular club officers), give access to climbing huts across the UK, support the BMC's important access and conservation work as giving other perks like retail discounts and Summit magazine.

Stephan Tietz said that the committee backs a number of changes to the membership fees to try to reduce the impact of the raise on younger members and raise revenue, whilst still being able to afford BMC membership:

The committee proposes to equalise joint and single memberships further by increasing the single membership to £6, plus BMC, and joint/family membership to £10 (= £5/head), plus BMC.
 Currently, joint/family membership is £3.25/head to the club while single memberships contribute £5.75. But, the club saves less than £2 per family due to printing and sending only one membership card. This change would raise an additional income of c£130 (or c£90 if we see a further drop in membership numbers).

 Robbie Pineda has suggested to introduce a discount for members who are younger than 30 years (at the beginning of the membership year). The committee agreed and prosed a sunder 30s membership rate of £2, plus BMC.

- This would minimise the rate increase for this age group and help recent graduates (which is in line with the club's constitutional objective). This will likely reduce the club's income by c£50.
- Mark Stitson has proposed that the committee should be authorised to raise subs in line with BMC raises in future, without putting this to an AGM, especially given the recent situation with the BMC. This would allow the club to react swiftly to changes.

The overarching aim is that the membership fee clearly splits into a club contribution and BMC affiliation cost. In combination these proposals would make the club contribution £2 for under 30s, £6 for single membership and £10 for joint membership. The additional BMC affiliation fee for 2020 will £20.25 per head and the club will pass on any discounts the BMC applies (e.g. non-UK residents and late renewals).

Stephan Tietz asked the floor for comments in relation to the proposed changes:

- Mike Esten commented that we have recently set our fee in relation to the BMC when we should decide
 what income we need to achieve our goals, set our member rate based on this, and then add the BMC.
 There was general approval around the room.
- Mike Esten also pointed out that the club has discussed the merits (or otherwise) of BMC membership before but had concluded that there was no real way out of paying it.
- Mike Esten also asked if this would be a deterrent for younger members. Mark Stitson replied that our
 fee is lower than ULMC's currently is. Sam Hardman pointed out that ULMC do have subsidised trips, but
 she suspected (as an ex ULMC member) that a larger deterrent is in the fact that ULGMC trips are not as
 organised for groups.
- Mark Stitson also pointed out that individual BMC members get 50% off their first years subs, but club members do not.
- Sam Hardman thought a discount for under 30s could be discriminatory if newly graduated students are the target.
- Heather Rumble asked if under 30s could be too large a group and put the club into a financially difficult position.
- Frances Mott made an alternative proposal to accommodate younger members and recent graduates. She proposed to introduce a reduced rate of £2 p/a, plus BMC, for the first two years of membership.
- Stephan Tietz acknowledged the concerns and agreed the alternative proposal to be more suitable. He
 agreed to put the alternative proposal to put the vote and encouraged the AGM to vote against the
 original proposal.

Robbie Pineda's proposal that the membership fee is decreased to £2 p/a, plus BMC, for under 25's was put to the vote:

0 members were for, 14 were against, 3 abstained (including proxy votes). The proposal was rejected.

Frances Mott's proposal to introduce a reduced rate of £2 p/a, plus BMC, for the first two years of membership was put to the vote:

9 members were for, 2 were against, 0 abstained (proxy vote not possible). The proposal was accepted.

Committee's proposal to raise single membership to £6, plus BMC, and joint membership to £10, plus BMC, was put to the vote:

17 members were for, 0 were against, 0 abstained (including proxy votes). The proposal was accepted.

Mark Stitson's proposal that the committee should be authorised to raise subs in line with BMC raises in future, without putting this to an AGM, was put to the vote:

17 members were for, 0 were against, 0 abstained (including proxy votes). The proposal was accepted.

Mike Esten commented that the club should not absorb rises in BMC membership fees and that members contributions to the BMC should be clearer on application forms and the membership cards. Stephan Tietz

agreed.

ACTION: Committee to action.

Mike Esten proposed that we write to the BMC as a club, outlining the large proportional cost of BMC affiliation and our concern that it will reduce the number of people able to join mountaineering clubs.

Mark Stitson seconded. Accepted by consent.

ACTION: Committee to action by 2020 AGM.

*Authorisation of expenditure for 2020

Stephan Tietz recommended the following expenditure in 2020:

- Committee expenses such as printing and postage of membership cards, other documents (e.g. newsletter archive). Costs incurred from banking and using GoCardless to process Direct Debits. It is usually in the order of £50-£150
- Expedition and Training Fund for 2020. This costs £200-400
- AGM dinner for ULMC committee in 2020. This usually costs around £50

Heather Rumble proposed; Frances Mott seconded. Accepted by consent.

Stephan Tietz and Mark Stitson asked the AGM to review our donations. He proposed to keep donations to mountain rescue organisations but to stop donating to the Snowdonia Society and Friends of the Lake District. The AGM discussed the proposal:

- Keith Mott explained that these had historically been a good way of keeping up to date with local issues, but was perhaps not needed now due to the internet.
- Heather Rumble expressed that she felt uncomfortable donating to these two groups considering that they lobby on political issues that may not represent all our members.

Carol Bristow proposed; Mike Esten seconded. Accepted by consent.

Programme for 2019 & 2020

Graham Cunningham (Meets Secretary) presented.

Meets report & planning

Graham stated that there was no meets list yet for 2020, as it is quite early given the date of the AGM. Graham stated that the meets list was getting quite formulaic and urged members to run meets to a wider range of places around the country. He suggested that the club is lacking personalised meets and also shorter notice ad-hoc meets, but stated the importance of these to a club.

*Date of 2020 AGM

Stephan Tietz stated that although numbers had not grown since moving the AGM, we have a much more diverse attendance and feedback has generally been positive (e.g. longer weekend). We therefore propose to continue the trial run of having the AGM during the Easter Snowdonia meet on Friday, 10th April 2020. Stephan Tietz put this to the vote.

14 members were for, 0 were against and 1 abstained (including proxy votes). The proposal was accepted.

Other reports

Trustees/hut wardens for Caseg Fraith and Fallcliffe

Phil Tarr reported that income was down by about 50% for both huts, but that it was unclear why. There is not a particular type of booking that has reduced noticeably.

Mark Stitson reported that Fallcliffe is operating at a profit, but not enough to undertake the maintenance it needs. A second loan from Caseg has been proposed to improve the bathroom area. There are also potential plans to modify the bathroom area in Caseg.

Trefor Owen enquired about the lease to Caseg from the National Trust. Phil Tarr replied that the lease has some time until it needs to be renewed, but that the hut committee are aware of the issue and are working on it.

Elections

*Club officers

Stephan Tietz stated that we have not received nominations to fill vacant Secretary role or to challenge incumbents. We therefore ask the AGM to confirm the committee "on block" by acclimation. The current committee are:

• President: Stephan Tietz

• Vice-President: Mike Hale (until Oct 2019 as his constitutional term ends)

Secretary: vacant

• Treasurer and Membership Secretary: Ian Ross

• Meets Secretary: Graham Cunningham

15 members voted for, 0 against, 0 abstained (including proxy votes). The proposal was accepted.

*Committee members without portfolio

Stephan Tietz stated that there are currently no committee members without portfolio. We have not received nominations to fill the four posts. If anyone steps forward, then we will put an affirmative vote at the next AGM.

*Scrutineer of ULGMC accounts

Mark Stitson is currently scrutineer and agreed to continue in this role.

Keith Mott proposed; Mike Esten seconded. The proposal was accepted by consent.

*ULMC representative

Francis Hardy has taken over from Robert Hardy as the ULMC representative for ULGMC. Stephan Tietz proposes that he continue if he agrees.

Mike Esten seconded. The proposal was accepted by consent.

Any other business

Constitutional changes

Mark Stitson proposed an amendment to the constitution, because it currently states that children wishing to be members should be children of couples. Mark pointed out that this is discriminatory against single parents.

Elanor Mott seconded. The proposal was accepted by consent.

ACTION: Committee to action by 2020 AGM

70th club anniversary (2020) and anniversaries of huts (2021)

Stephan Tietz highlighted that these anniversaries are coming up and asked for volunteers to organise.
